
Comprehensive Trash Abatement Program for the Dog River Watershed 2019-2021

EPA/GOMP Grant Objectives


- Reduce trash in one stream segment of the upper dog river watershed by 50 percent through the demonstration of alternative, sustainable, litter capture devices.
- Train 10 high school students and 10 community members in strategic watershed assessment to implement trash monitoring strategy.
- Increase by 10 percent, the number of truck-owners who use a truck-bed trash can to secure litter and debris as a result of a public awareness campaign.
- Present project findings and results at a minimum of three (3) conferences to transfer lessons learned to other communities.
- Publish a Trash Reduction Strategy for the City of Mobile providing recommendations for strategically siting trash capture, engaging community in monitoring and improving enforcement activities.








How the water flows determines where the litter pools which informs where the litter is coming from & where to capture.








Track the Trash

Transponder: Electrical device designed to receive a specific signal and automatically transmit a specific reply. Similar words: electrical device.


Movement and related weather data were collected from throughout the watershed in 2020 revealing patterns in litter behavior.






MBNEP - GIS exercise to identify major concentrations of impervious area and characterize

This list does not contain all efforts to remove litter from within the Dog River Watershed.

Numbers presented are provided to DRCR by our grant partners, Osprey Initiative, and the City of Mobile. The MLK Day of Service Cleanup is a joint event of the Mobile United Natural Resource Task Force.

* Numbers are shown in pounds except there ease of disposal requires measurement in cubic yards. For consistency, we used an approximated bag weight of 22 pounds = 1 cubic yard and give an approximate weight total. NOTE: City of Mobile follows Fiscal Year beginning October 1st while DRCR follows Calendar Year beginning January 1st.

How Healthy is Dog River?

DRCR has approximately 20 AWW monitors who have collected monthly data on water chemistry and bacteria for the past 5 years (2016-2020).

When we revived our water monitoring efforts in 2015, our goals were to answer the following questions:

- (1) Is it safe to swim in Dog River?
- (2) (2) Is water quality in Dog River getting better or worse over time?
- (3) (3) Is sea level rise affecting salinity in Dog River?

First Public Hearing February 25, 2021 at 2:00 pm

The Mobile City Planning Commission will hold a public hearing and take public comment on the proposed Unified Development Code (UDC). Alabama state law requires at least two public hearings for adoption – one with the Planning Commission and one with the City Council. This will be the first public hearing to consider adoption of the UDC.
